


The Pandemic of Sin


Genesis 3:17-19 (ESV)

and to dust you shall return.”




God's Solution: The Offspring of the woman

3

Genesis 3:15 (ESV)

¹⁵ I will put **enmity** between you and the woman,
and between your offspring and her offspring;
he shall **bruise your head**,
and you shall bruise his heel.”



God's Solution: The Offspring of the woman

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Luke 3:21-4:13

- Jesus is the offspring of the woman who defeated Satan (battle)
- The Son of God who was born (birth)
- He identified with sinful humanity in order to rescue them (baptism)

Luke 4:14-44 Proclaim Jesus As God's Promised Messiah!

1. Jesus identifies Himself as God's Promised Messiah (Luke 4:14-30)

Luke 4 (ESV)

¹⁴ And Jesus returned in the power of the Spirit to Galilee, and a report about him went out through all the surrounding country.

Luke 3 (ESV)

²¹ Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heavens were opened, ²² and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily form, like a dove; and a voice came from heaven, “You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.”

Luke 4 (ESV)

¹ And Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness ² for forty days, being tempted by the devil.

1. Jesus identifies Himself as God's Promised Messiah (Luke 4:14-30)


Luke 4

¹⁷ And the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written,

¹⁸ “The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me
to proclaim good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives
and recovering of sight to the blind,
to set at liberty those who are oppressed,

¹⁹ to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.”



- Prophesying concerning Israel's captivity in Babylon
- Assurance that God will act to deliver His people
- Who will God send to proclaim His deliverance?

1. Jesus identifies Himself as God's Promised Messiah (Luke 4:14-30)

Luke 3

⁴ As it is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet,

"The voice of one crying in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord,
make his paths straight.'

⁵ Every valley shall be filled,
and every mountain and hill shall be made low,
and the crooked shall become straight,
and the rough places shall become level ways,
⁶ and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.'" ...

¹⁵ As the people were in expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Christ, ¹⁶ John answered them all, saying, "I baptize you with water, but he who is mightier than I is coming, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire."

Jesus' 1st Coming: Spiritual Restoration

Ephesians 2:1-6 (ESV)

¹ And you were **dead in the trespasses and sins** ...⁴ But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us,⁵ even when we were dead in our trespasses, **made us alive together with Christ**—by grace you have been saved—⁶ and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus,

Physical Restoration at Jesus' 2nd Coming – New Heaven and New Earth

Revelation 21:4 (ESV)

⁴ He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away.”

Jesus' 2nd Coming: Time of Vengeance

Revelation 19:11-15 (ESV)

¹¹ Then I saw heaven opened, and behold, a white horse! The one sitting on it is called Faithful and True, **and in righteousness he judges and makes war.** ...¹³ He is clothed in a robe dipped in blood, and the name by which he is called is The Word of God. ...¹⁵ From his mouth comes a sharp sword with which to strike down the nations, and he will rule them with a rod of iron. **He will tread the winepress of the fury of the wrath of God the Almighty.**

Luke 4

²⁰ And he rolled up the scroll and gave it back to the attendant and sat down. And the eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. ²¹ And he began to say to them, “Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.”

Responses to Jesus' teaching

Luke 4

²² And all spoke well of him and **marveled** at the gracious words that were coming from his mouth. And they said, “Is not this Joseph's son?” ²³ And he said to them, “Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, “‘Physician, heal yourself.’ What we have **heard you did** at Capernaum, **do here** in your hometown as well.”” ²⁴ And he said, “Truly, I say to you, no prophet is acceptable in his hometown.

1. Jesus identifies Himself as God's Promised Messiah (Luke 4:14-30)

Why Jesus did not do miraculous works in Nazareth?

Luke 5

In accordance with Jesus' will and upon faith => a plea, not a demand

¹²While he was in one of the cities, there came a man full of leprosy. And when he saw Jesus, he fell on his face and begged him, “**Lord, if you will, you can make me clean.**” ¹³And Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him, saying, “**I will; be clean.**” And immediately the leprosy left him.

Luke 11

Miracles are subject to misinterpretation due to hardened hearts

¹⁴Now he was casting out a demon that was mute. When the demon had gone out, the mute man spoke, and the people marveled. ¹⁵But some of them said, “**He casts out demons by Beelzebul, the prince of demons,**” ¹⁶while others, to test him, kept seeking from him a sign from heaven.

1. Jesus identifies Himself as God's Promised Messiah (Luke 4:14-30)

Foreshadowing Jesus' future rejection

Acts 3:12-15 (ESV)

¹² And when Peter saw it he addressed the people: “**Men of Israel**, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we have made him walk? ¹³ The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our fathers, glorified his servant Jesus, whom you delivered over and denied in the presence of Pilate, when he had decided to release him. ¹⁴ But you denied the Holy and Righteous One, and asked for a murderer to be granted to you, ¹⁵ and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses.

1. Jesus identifies Himself as God's Promised Messiah (Luke 4:14-30)

- In fulfilment of Isaiah's prophesy of God's promised deliverance but of limited time period
- Rejection by His hometown foreshadows His future rejection by the Jewish people

Blessing to the Gentiles

Luke 4

²⁵ But in truth, I tell you, there were many widows in Israel in the days of Elijah, when the heavens were shut up three years and six months, and a great famine came over all the land, ²⁶ and Elijah was sent to none of them but only to Zarephath, in the land of Sidon, to a woman who was a widow. ²⁷ And there were many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed, but only Naaman the Syrian."

Blessing to the Gentiles

1 Kings 17:8-16 (ESV)

⁸ Then the word of the LORD came to him, ⁹ “Arise, go to Zarephath, which belongs to Sidon, and dwell there. Behold, I have commanded a widow there to feed you.” ¹⁰ So he arose and went to Zarephath. And when he came to the gate of the city, behold, a widow was there gathering sticks. And he called to her and said, “Bring me a little water in a vessel, that I may drink.” ¹¹ And as she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, “Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand.” ¹² And she said, “As the LORD your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of flour in a jar and a little oil in a jug. And now I am gathering a couple of sticks that I may go in and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it and die.” ¹³ And Elijah said to her, “Do not fear; go and do as you have said. But first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterward make something for yourself and your son. ¹⁴ For thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, ‘The jar of flour shall not be spent, and the jug of oil shall not be empty, until the day that the LORD sends rain upon the earth.’” ¹⁵ And she went and did as Elijah said. And she and he and her household ate for many days. ¹⁶ The jar of flour was not spent, neither did the jug of oil become empty, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah.



Blessing to the Gentiles

2 Kings 5:6-8 (ESV)

6 And he brought the letter to the king of Israel, which read, “When this letter reaches you, know that I have sent to you Naaman my servant, that you may cure him of his leprosy.” **7** And when the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, “**Am I God, to kill and to make alive, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy?**

Only consider, and see how he is seeking a quarrel with me.”

8 But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent to the king, saying, “Why have you torn your clothes? **Let him come now to me, that he may know that there is a prophet in Israel.**”



2 Kings 5:14 (ESV)

¹⁴ So he went down and **dipped himself** seven times in the Jordan, **according to the word of the man of God**, and his flesh was restored like the flesh of a little child, and **he was clean**.

2 Kings 5:15-18 (ESV)

¹⁵ Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company, and he came and stood before him. And he said, **“Behold, I know that there is no God in all the earth but in Israel;** ...Then Naaman said, **“If not, please let there be given to your servant two mule loads of earth, for from now on your servant will not offer burnt offering or sacrifice to any god but the LORD.** ¹⁸ In this matter may the LORD pardon your servant: when my master goes into the house of Rimmon to worship there, leaning on my arm, and I bow myself in the house of Rimmon, when I bow myself in the house of Rimmon, the LORD pardon your servant in this matter.”

Blessing to the Gentiles



1. Jesus identifies Himself as God's Promised Messiah (Luke 4:14-30)

- In fulfilment of Isaiah's prophesy of God's promised deliverance but of limited time period
- Rejection by His hometown foreshadows His future rejection by the Jewish people
- Rejection by the Jews will result in God's blessings coming to the Gentiles (cf. Romans 11)

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Luke 4

²⁸ When they heard these things, all in the synagogue **were filled with wrath.** ²⁹ And they rose up and drove him out of the town and brought him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that **they could throw him down the cliff.** ³⁰ But passing through their midst, he went away.

2. Jesus demonstrates that He is the Messiah (Luke 4:31-41)

Luke 4

³¹ And he went down to Capernaum, a city of Galilee. And he was teaching them on the Sabbath, ³² and they were astonished at his teaching, for **his word possessed authority**. ³³ And in the synagogue there was a man who had the spirit of an unclean demon, and he cried out with a loud voice, ³⁴ “Ha! What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are—the Holy One of God.” ³⁵ But **Jesus rebuked him**, saying, “Be silent and come out of him!” And when the demon had thrown him down in their midst, **he came out of him, having done him no harm**. ³⁶ And they were all amazed and said to one another, “What is this word? For with authority and power he commands the unclean spirits, and they come out!” ³⁷ And reports about him went out into every place in the surrounding region.

2. Jesus demonstrates that He is the Messiah (Luke 4:31-41)

Luke 4

³¹ And he went down to Capernaum, a city of Galilee. And he was teaching them on the Sabbath, ³² and they were astonished at his teaching, for **his word possessed authority**.
³⁸ And he arose and left the synagogue and entered Simon's house. Now Simon's mother-in-law was ill with a high fever, and they appealed to him on her behalf. ³⁹ And he stood over her and **rebuked the fever**, and **it left her**, and **immediately she rose** and began to **serve** them.
⁴⁰ Now when the sun was setting, all those who had any who were sick with various diseases brought them to him, and he laid his hands on every one of them and healed them. ⁴¹ And demons also came out of many, crying, "You are the Son of God!" But he rebuked them and would not allow them to speak, because they knew that he was the Christ.

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2. Jesus demonstrates that He is the Messiah (Luke 4:31-41)

Luke 1

³⁵And the angel answered her, “The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be called **holy—the Son of God**.

Luke 2

¹⁰And the angel said to them, “Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. ¹¹For unto you is born this day in the city of David **a Savior, who is Christ the Lord**.

The demoniac testimony added nothing new to the revelation of Jesus' identity

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Why Jesus refused to accept demoniac testimony?

Luke 9

²⁰ Then he said to them, “But who do you say that I am?” And Peter answered, “The Christ of God.”

²¹ And he strictly charged and commanded them to tell this to no one, ²² saying, “The Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised.”

The role of Jesus' Messiahship is not fully revealed or understood yet

Why Jesus refused to accept demoniac testimony?

2 Corinthians 6:14-15 (ESV)

¹⁴ Do not be unequally yoked with unbelievers. For what partnership has righteousness with lawlessness? Or what fellowship has light with darkness? ¹⁵ What accord has Christ with Belial? Or what portion does a believer share with an unbeliever?

Acts 16:16-18 (ESV)

¹⁶ As we were going to the place of prayer, we were met by a slave girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners much gain by fortune-telling. ¹⁷ She followed Paul and us, crying out, “These men are servants of the Most High God, who proclaim to you the way of salvation.” ¹⁸ And this she kept doing for many days. Paul, having become greatly annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, “I command you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her.” And it came out that very hour.

God's work is not to have any tinge of association with Satan and evil

2. Jesus demonstrates that He is the Messiah (Luke 4:31-41)

- His authoritative and powerful word cast out demons and healed sickness
- The demons' testimony attested to Jesus' identity but not accepted by Jesus

3. Jesus' mission is to proclaim God's deliverance (Luke 4:42-44)

- Jesus must fulfil His God-appointed task

Luke 4

⁴²And when it was day, he departed and went into a desolate place. And the people sought him and came to him, and would have kept him from leaving them, ⁴³but he said to them, “I must preach the good news of the kingdom of God to the other towns as well; for I was sent for this purpose.” ⁴⁴And he was preaching in the synagogues of Judea.

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- Jesus must fulfil His God-appointed task
- His message is the good news of the kingdom of God, which ultimately is accomplished by Him through His death and resurrection
- His audience is not to be limited
- The task of proclaiming God's kingdom is given to His followers (Acts 1:8)

Acts 1:8 (ESV)

8 But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth.”

- If you proclaim to your non-Christian family member or friend that Jesus is God's Promised Messiah who will ultimately solve all the ills of this world, what do you think will be their response? How would you answer them?
- What will assure you from today's passage to continue to trust in Jesus and to proclaim Him to others?
